SITTING OUT IN OUR GARDEN of late, we have witnessed the new beginning of a family of blackbirds nesting in a bush just a few feet from our patio. The adults are very busy feeding their young with what seems like endless supplies of worms. These little fledglings are completely dependent on the adults. For us they are an example of hope and new life around us. Their dependence is very much like those in intensive care suffering from the coronavirus. And yet, tirelessly they bring food for their young just like we are doing in our own homes and as we reach out to others.

In our villages, during this crisis, there have been many small acts of generosity and kindness. This strikes at the very heart of what it is to be human as life begins with small beginnings. In my reflections (mellsgroup.church/holyweekeaster/mells-group-reflections) there is an overwhelming sense of folk reaching out to help others.

In a wider context, we have many who are delivering essential services to keep the nation going and that includes our farmers. Each Thursday we continue pay tribute to all these folk.

On May 12<sup>th</sup> we remember Florence Nightingale, whose life and work exemplifies the caring profession's extraordinary vocation just like every member of the NHS and every carer today. It is a fitting tribute to her that the emergency hospital opening at the ExCel Centre in London is called the NHS Nightingale Hospital.



Florence Nightingale was born 200 years ago, on May 12th 1820. Best known as the Lady with the Lamp who saved many lives in the hospitals of the Crimean War, she was also a social reformer, a statistician and the founder of modern nursing.



She was named after the Italian city of her birth, but the family moved back to England the following year, and she was brought up in Derbyshire. Here – and elsewhere – she had several experiences that she believed were calls from God to devote her life to the service of others. She never married, but among her several close friends was Sidney Herbert, who became Secretary of War and helped to make her work in Crimea possible. Some claim that she reduced the death rate in hospitals there from 42percent to two per-

cent. She introduced hand-washing and other hygiene improvements, but she never claimed personal credit for reducing the death rate.

Her work inspired nurses in the American Civil War, and in 1883 she became the first recipient of the Royal Red Cross. In 1907, she was the first woman to be awarded the Order of Merit. She died in 1910. Her image appeared on the reverse of £10 banknotes issued by the Bank of England from 1975 until 1994.

#### SUPPORTING GOOD MENTAL HEALTH

A series of reflections on how to cope with anxiety and loneliness in the face of the coronavirus pandemic, including simple Christian meditation techniques and five tips, have been published by the Church of England.

A number of actions that could help people feeling isolated or worried, as well as those who grieve, are put forward in a new guide Supporting Good Mental Health and written by Durham University academic Revd Professor Chris Cook with Ruth Rice Director of the Christian mental health charity 'Renew Wellbeing'.

#### CHANTRY AND WHATLEY IN THE TIME OF CORONAVIRUS

We realised in Chantry and Whatley in mid-March that events were moving rapidly, and that we needed to make efforts to connect up the residents of our villages, so that we were as well-prepared as possible locally to cope with what was





to come. This was before the lock-down, and none of us had any real idea of the strange times that lay ahead.

So a group of us delivered letters door-to-door, and set up an email group (with help from the Whatley and Chantry Community Association) to reach as many local people as possible. We supplied the contact details of volunteers who could provide help to those needing support. These efforts quickly grew and lots of wonderful people came forward to offer help with everything from shopping to collecting prescriptions to dogwalking and gardening. Emails from our Helping Hands group now go out every few days to about 110 people, providing information on all these topics, and putting people in touch with each other. We send out details of all the excellent local businesses who are now delivering essential supplies - food, drink, pet-food, newspapers and even icecream from the lovely Palette and Pasture at Trudoxhill. Sightings are reported of elusive items like bread flour and eggs, and we provide valuable updates from organisations like the Frome Medical Practice and Somerset Waste Partnership. We now have a "village swop-shop" section in every Helping Hands email, and have succeeded in finding good homes for lots of spare items, and meeting needs for equipment such as computers for home-schooling and bikes for outdoor exercise. Plants, books, DVDs, sourdough starters and DIY supplies are swapped around the villages, all with the appropriate hygiene precautions! As none of us can go to the tip any longer, this is especially useful for those making use of time in lock-down to have a good clear-out, or complete a project.

We're also in close touch with Whatley Parish Council, who keep us informed on briefings from Somerset and Mendip councils, and the services available such as grants for local businesses.

We've made good use of the Whatley and Chantry Facebook page to put the word out about what's going on locally: this also makes it easy to share helpful information coming from lots of other groups and organisations on social media.

One popular initiative has been our weekly pop-up shop, provided on Thursday afternoons by Cam Valley Foods at the Parish Field in Whatley and the churchyard in Chantry. They bring us fresh milk, eggs, cheese, sausages, bacon and ham, fresh vegetables and lots of other goodies, and are much appreciated by local people who can't now get out to the shops. They also give us all a chance to socialise with our neighbours for a little while in the safely-spaced queues!

Another chance to set eyes on our neighbours comes with the regular Thursday night clapping for the NHS at 8 p.m, which is well-supported locally.

Broadband services in Chantry and Whatley are still as inadequate as ever, which is unfortunate now we are all so reliant on the internet to stay in touch with friends and family, and to order supplies. Many of us are looking forward to the promised arrival of Truespeed and full-fibre broadband before too long!

A useful WiFI hub has recently been installed in Chantry church, funded by the Whatley Common Good Trust, and has proved invaluable as a back-up service when drop-outs occur. Although the church is sadly now closed, the connection can be accessed from outside and the porch – contact Vivienne Pay or Jan Bramston (see

Sadly "Molly from Mells" died suddenly on April 1st after a long time of declining health. I call her "Molly from Mells", even though she has been living in Holcombe for ten years, because I feel sure others across our five parishes will be remembering her as that too!

After Molly retired from her work as a milk recorder visiting dairy farms, and perhaps earlier in the 30 years while she lived in New Street in Mells, she had all sorts of voluntary interests locally. Just a few that stand out in my memory are obviously involvement with the church, the Girls Guide Association and Riding for the Disabled, but also many other things like leading holiday clubs for children; chairing the Mells Daffodil Festival committee, driving hospital cars, organizing dog shows on the playing field and raising various funds through coffee mornings and all sorts of sales. Some of you probably remember a lot more and, in the first years that she was in Holcombe, she continued in similar way.

She had no relatives but she had four really big loves in life – one was walking in our countryside and the other three were horses, cows and her dogs, with the main passion being for border terriers. Those four loves gave her the idea for one of the best this she left us. It was her initiative, back in the early 90s, to start leading a group of locals to get out and walk together on Saturday afternoons. That inspiration continues today as the Walking on Saturdays Group.

The media in its many forms is full of such acts and I, personally, have had so many kind telephone calls and offers of help from neighbours I do feel that when at last we come through this thing we shall all be stronger and more generous and compassionate and may well have learned that we can live happily with far less of the things which previously we considered necessary.

I am writing this during the wonderful weather of the Easter weekend. How ironic that when we have the best Easter weather for many years none of us can go out to enjoy it. Those of us who have gardens are so very fortunate and we must spare thought for those in town flats where isolation must be so much harder to bear.

The unmowed churchyard is a golden carpet of celandines which glow fluorescently in the sunshine. They really do glow and if you look closely at a celandine you can see why. Each petal is coated in what looks like high gloss enamel which reflects the sun. Astonishing, magical, miraculous, however you like to think of it.

The current warm weather has unfurled the leaves on the 40-50ft balsam poplar in my orchard and the air – and the house - is loaded with the heady spicy perfume that the oily leaves release when newly opened. Standing beneath the tree, the sticky leaf cases sticking to the dogs' paws and the strange long caterpillar-like grey and yellow scarlet tipped catkins dropping on and around us, the scent is almost dizzy making. And it

travels a long distance around; I can still smell it when I cross the road to post letters in the box opposite my gate.

Coinciding with this good weather the magnolias and camellias are at their flamboyant perfection, mine, luckily this year having escaped any seasonal frost and gales. Those of us who, like myself, have acid soil can revel in these beauties which can grow 12-15ft tall and wide. Those with alkaline soil can, of course, grow these treasures in containers. They are about the only thing I can grow with profusion in my shady garden and once they finish flowering I have to be content with ferns and various ground cover plants (and weeds, of course). The best and most vigorous ground cover is the vinca which I stole from the Bishop's Palace garden in Wells, more than 20



years ago. One tiny three inch thread has now romped all over the empty spaces. It is a variety I have never seen elsewhere – large rich purple flowers with narrow separated petals like little spoked wheels. I suppose I shouldn't have admitted stealing this but anyway, sadly dear Bishop Big Jim is no longer around to apologise to and anyway it just sort of happened that a tiny bit got hooked into my pocket when I stooped to admire it all those years ago.

A wildlife minded friend suggested a solution to the question of what might have killed, plucked and removed the hen pheasant in the churchyard which I mentioned last month. He said he had seen a sparrowhawk kill a large pigeon which he found too heavy to lift. He plucked and ate enough to make the remainder carryable, thus cleverly distributing the weight, some inside the sparrowhawk, the rest transportable. I agreed that the pheasant might have been treated likewise.

So one mystery solved but today I have discovered another. The stone walls of my old converted stables have had odd holes patched over their 180 years, occasionally even with the odd brick or half brick. Just such a hole is above the bracket where my peanut and fat balls feeders hang. This morning one of the half bricks (which had always appeared quite secure) was on the ground below the hole and the remaining half brick was pock-marked with what looked like peck marks. I often have woodpeckers on the



feeders. Could I now have brick peckers? The dawn chorus is, of course, at its peak now. Such an uplifting joy around 5.30, although I have to confess to dozing off again afterwards most days. No cockerels around here so the wake-up call is down to the pheasant's rusty croak followed by the harsh crows' call and then the gentle wood pigeon. Then all the musicians follow – thrush, blackbird, all the small familiar ones and the migrants, wood warblers,garden warblers and all the "little brown jobs" that I am not good at recognising. All combined in a glorious orchestra of sound punctuated by the original pheasant, crow and pigeon like a sort of Greek chorus in the background.

Well, I do hope we all managed to celebrate our very

different Easter week-end in ways that brought comfort and hope. However our own lives may have changed during these strange times we can rely on the unchanging cycle of the seasons and the natural life around us through God's grace in maintaining His constant never ending renewal of life.

I hope to see you all again in June if Peter and Lin manage to produce 5-Alive in these difficult times. Meanwhile, stay safe and do take advantage of any willing offers of help where needed. And many, many thanks to those so bravely and generously offering help.
